David Gladstone, who is hosting the exhibition, was in charge of the organisation and opening of the first British Embassy in the Ukraine in 1991.

The work on view dates from the 1950s to the late 1990s and is by well established masters of realism,

Soviet realism and post-impressionism.

Although not well known in the UK, the range of art, dating both from before and after the momentous break-up of the Soviet Union, has impressed both critics and audiences at previous exhibitions for its vitality and accessibility.

On Saturday November 23 there will be a special viewing of the paintings, a piano recital by Nikolai Demidenko and a buffet supper.
